



As a passionate advocate for Indigenous resurgence through education, Carolyn has dedicated over 20 years to serving as both an educator and administrator in the K-12 system.


Currently, Carolyn is a valued faculty member at the University of British Columbia, teaching in the Teacher Education and NITEP programs. Drawing from her deep community roots and extensive professional experience, she mentors and empowers pre-service teachers to develop their understanding of Indigenous history, education, and ancestral ways of knowing. Her work focuses on decolonizing educational systems to ensure a brighter future for Indigenous peoples and the seven generations yet to come.

Carolyn is a highly accomplished speaker and author, renowned for illuminating transformative pathways within education and inspiring meaningful change. Her critically acclaimed book,

Restorying Education: Decolonizing Your Practice with a Critical Lens, provides essential insights and actionable strategies for embedding Indigenous perspectives throughout classrooms and shaping culturally responsive educational policies. Dr. Chas Desjarlais is a Nehiyaw-Michif educator, scholar, and leader in Indigenous education. She serves as the Director of Instruction – Indigenous Education at the Vancouver School Board, where she works to advance transformative and culturally responsive learning experiences for Indigenous students and communities. Known by her traditional name, Helper of Thunderbirds, Dr. Desjarlais is a proud citizen of Cold Lake First Nations, identifies as a Treaty Six Iskwew, and is the devoted mother of two daughters, Paige and Kaylyn.

Dr. Desjarlais completed her Doctorate of Education (EdD) in Educational Leadership & Policy at the University of British Columbia in 2024. Her doctoral research—titled "Iskotew: Fire-Keeping the Fire Lit Indigenous Iskotwew (Women) Leading in Decolonizing Education Systems"—explored the lived experiences of Indigenous women leading efforts to decolonize educational organizations. Her study highlights the ongoing struggle and resilience required to balance cultural identity with systemic leadership demands, shining light on both the unique perspectives and the challenges faced by Indigenous women in educational leadership roles.

Dr. Desjarlais's academic and professional journey contributes significantly to the growing body of work on Indigenous women's leadership, while also drawing attention to the underrepresentation of Indigenous women in decision-making positions within education. Through her research, advocacy, and policy work, she continues to champion the integration of Indigenous knowledge, community engagement, and decolonizing approaches in educational practices and governance.

A respected leader and mentor, Dr. Desjarlais is deeply committed to building strong, culturally safe education systems that honor and uplift Indigenous voices, ways of knowing, and for the future of all learners.

- Coached over 300 Indigenous entrepreneurs around the world to build businesses as acts of love

Jace's commitment to cultural safety is evident in her development of educational programs like "we are medicine," designed to equip individuals and organizations with tools to move from awareness to actionable steps in addressing violence and fostering healing.

Her presentations are known for being both hands-on and inspiring, encouraging professionals to critically assess and enhance their cultural competencies.

Kristy co-authored a book with Phyllis Webstad, *Decolonization and Me: Conversations about Healing a Nation* and Ourselves, to help address questions and clarify why learning the truth about the injustices faced by Indigenous Peoples in Canada is important.

Kristy is a dedicated PhD Candidate in Curriculum and Instruction, with her doctoral research centered on exploring Métis identity and enhancing understanding of Indigenous perspectives in education. She holds a Master of Arts in Curriculum and Instruction, where her graduate thesis focused on developing more inclusive school environments and addressing systemic barriers to equity in education.

With over 20 years of experience working in the education sector, Kristy has served as a dynamic K-12 teacher and as a sessional instructor at the University of Victoria. Her rich background as both an educator and an academic support leader has equipped her with a deep understanding of the complexities and opportunities within educational systems. Kristy's professional journey has been consistently informed by a commitment to inclusive education and a passion for integrating diverse Indigenous ways of knowing and learning into curriculum design and classroom practice.

Renowned as a visionary educator and leader, Dr. Wilton has had a profound impact on Indigenous education, shaping teaching frameworks, research initiatives, and educational policies that uplift Indigenous students locally, provincially, nationally, and internationally.

With a career distinguished by dedication to excellence in teaching and learning, Dr. Wilton is celebrated for her ability to design transformative Indigenous education programs and culturally responsive learning environments.
